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


#### **SCHOOL TRIPS**

They were shown how quickly fire can spread through a room and how important it is to have a fire alarm and an escape plan. In a fire engine, they only carry about the same amount of 4 baths of water and would only use about a tenth of this to put out a room fire.



Not only did we learn about safety, we learned about how dangerous it is to make a hoax phone call and how every call has to be investigated.

The main messages we learned were to check our fire alarms regulary and if we have a fire at home or school to 'get out, stay out and call the fire brigade'.
