Walk to School Week



Foundation Stage or another KS1 class. If this proves to be successful we shall be rolling it out with a view to extending it to include the Key Stage Two classes.

The Play Hub itself is a holistic process that works with the school to change both the human and physical play environment thereby transforming play at lunchtimes. It

is our hope that by introducing a wide range of open-ended, recyclable materials from the Play Hub, older children will encourage younger children to extend their creative and critical thinking in line with the characteristics of Effective Learning whilst at the same time support and challenge the younger children they are engaging with.
