THEMED WEEKS AND DAYS

Maths Week



This year the theme of Maths Week was "Art in Maths" each year group had a bespoke creative maths challenge set for them by Mrs Williams. Each challenge enabled the children to use and apply their mathematical knowledge working at their own individual level. The artwork created has been excellent. During Maths Week the children in Year 1 got to use the new iPad Minis to help with their challenge. The challenges were:

Y6: "Discover Pi" the children had to prove Pi

and then create a Cityscape picture using the numbers in Pi= 3.141592653 etc.

Y5: "Can you make a curve from a straight line?" Parabolic curve pictures using card and thread.

Y4: "Perimeter and Area" creating rectangles which have a set area and perimeter.

Y3: "Japanese Multiplication" learning about different multiplication methods and then displaying the method creatively.

Y2: "Shape, Symmetry and Fractions" making symmetrical pictures using fractions of shapes.



Y1: "How many triangles?" using 9 straws to visually show how many triangles can be made.

Rec: "Shape Dinosaurs" properties of shapes

This put us 1st in our pool with 18 points. Because we were first in our pool we went

through to the Cup division knockouts (also top 16).

In the Knockouts we made it to the final against Compton Buffalos who beat us 10-4 so we ended up in second place out of 48 schools, which is a tremendous achievement and the best King's has ever done in this competition.
